

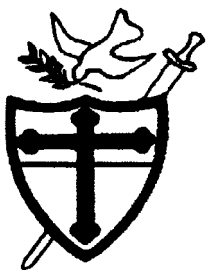

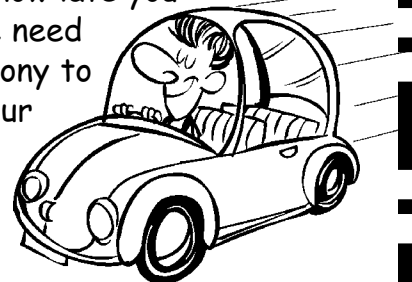

I would like to suggest three areas that we need to agree on. First, we need to focus on, **A Common Reality.** Galatians 2:20 says, *"I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God, who*

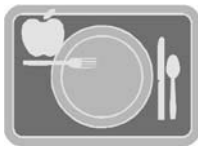


Tuition Payment Information

The place you flee to when temptation surrounds you.

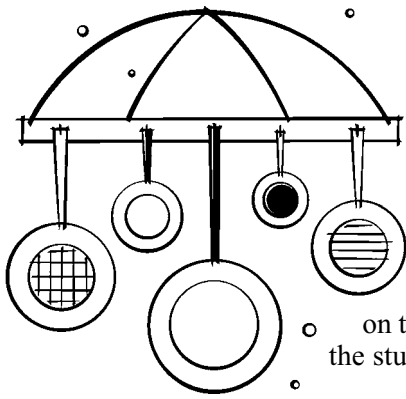
The place where you cast your burdens.

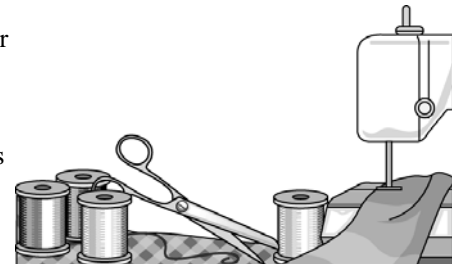

loved me and gave himself for me.” I believe that in this teaching we are to die to our fleshly self. The illustration I always like is that of trying to irritate a dead person. No matter what is said or implied by my words or deeds a dead man would not be offended. Are you reacting as a dead man to things said about you? This is so hard for me. It hurts when others say things about me. The use of words and actions is one of the most damaging assaults to biblical unity.

Secondly, we must agree to adopt **A Common Attitude**. ‘Let your attitude be the same as that of Christ Jesus,’ the Bible says. Phil. 2:3-8 states that Jesus, who is our example, took on the nature of a servant in order to be best used of the Lord. I would remind

you that a servant is never out of work. As a man thinks in his heart, so he is. Are you trying to imitate the attitude of Jesus in your life? It is not an easy thing to do, and I struggle with you in this every day.

Lastly, we need to agree on **A Common Solution** to reaching a spiritually honoring degree of unity. I believe the key is found in 1Peter 4:7-11 where we are encouraged to love each other deeply. Why, because love covers a multitude of sins. Sin is the great unity killer. Much can be forgiven when Christian love is at the forefront. In Colossians, chapter 3, there is tremendous teaching on how to bring about life-changing Biblical unity. None of it is easily attainable. These are the garments of a diligent Christ seeker. Put on the clothes of compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and

patience. Be ready to forgive, never hold grudges. Here is the hardest part for me. No matter how you act, whether in what you say or what you do, do it in the Lord’s name. Yikes!!! You might as well just shoot me right now. How can I possibly do these things? That is exactly the right question. You can’t. You are unable to do it. No one apart from Christ COULD do it. Thanks be to God that He will accomplish through us what we could never do on our own. All things are possible with Christ.

Growing together is a theme that will only become a reality as we each commit to growing individually in our walks with the Lord. We will share an eternity together and I am so glad that I have the families to grow together with at Bracken Christian School .

UNIFORMS ARE NOWHERE

Have you ever been confused about what something says? For example; what is the message in the letters above? Have you ever read the description of something and then seen it illustrated and been baffled as to how one related to the other? I get those kinds of sensations when I consider how some respond to the school's uniform dress code.

The uniform standard set by the Board is the designated uniform apparel provided by Parker School Uniforms. The school has allowed freedom for uniform wear to be purchased from other sources under the conditions that it matches in style, color, and texture the uniform standard. However, some freedom from that standard was given in regard to uniform pants that has now developed into a major departure from the uniform standard.

This violates not just the standard of the dress code but the reason for the dress code. As a Christian school our emphasis is not on impressing others but on glorifying God and being pleasing in His sight. We learn early in Scripture and teach frequently that God

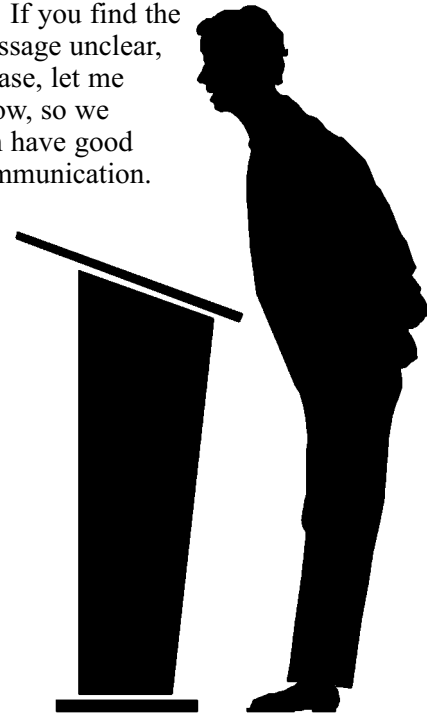
is interested in our hearts, our character, and our relationship with Him, not our outward appearance. We wear uniforms to put our student's focus on seeing another student as an individual created in God's image not as a Gap model or cool dude. Uniforms don't erase personalities; they really magnify them, not their clothes. Clothes don't make the man and one can't dress for success; that's all God's business.

What may have begun as grace has become a problem. I understand that what sometimes is granted as grace can become expected as a guarantee. Therefore, for several reasons, I am going to graciously allow some freedoms that have become accepted to continue this year only. The standard has not changed, so I don't encourage you to let your student's desire for "conformity to nonconformity" be a cause for problems. I will still enforce boundaries even though some guidelines seem vague.

Therefore, I will allow the variations in the pants that have developed. They must still be within bounds of a khaki color and have belt loops. They cannot be bell-bottoms nor have the pant leg split to "fit over the shoe." Nor can the pants be hip huggers or baggy. The pant legs are not to drag the ground. Belts are to be solid black or

brown without decorations. No variations in school shoes will be accepted. Boots are not acceptable, nor are high top shoes. No other variation in uniform wear seems to be causing problems or has developed an unofficial acceptance. Overall, I am very pleased with the way most students proudly wear their uniforms. I believe that the return to the school standard next year for pants will lift a burden and restore a sense of freedom that is enjoyed when boundaries are clear.

If you find the message unclear, please, let me know, so we can have good communication.



PSAT/NMSQT

Ninth, tenth, and eleventh graders have the opportunity to take part in the PSAT/NMSQT program on Tuesday, October 15, 2002. This is the only time PSAT/NMSQT will be offered this year. PSAT, which is taken by nearly one million students in preparation for the SAT assessment, includes academic tests that measure verbal, math, and writing skills. The Score Report Plus will include not only scores and itemized feedback on test questions, but an "Improve Your Skills" section. The PSAT/NMSQT is great practice for the SAT, and juniors taking the test may qualify to enter National Merit Scholarship Corporation programs.

The students will receive a PSAT/NMSQT Student Bulletin full of useful information, including a full-length Practice Test. The fee for taking the test is \$10; parents will be billed for that fee on the October statement.

Welcome back to another school year. By this time, everything seems to have fallen into a comfortable routine. It is great to see the kids return after a summer break. The summer seemed very short, to me, until I saw some of the students at orientation night. Many had grown noticeably. It is encouraging to see these physical changes in our students because it serves as a visual reminder that growth is taking place. This year our theme as a school is "Growing with God."

When He was a young boy, the Scripture says, "Jesus grew in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and men" Luke 2:52. This is a great educational verse as well as a parenting one. It clearly breaks down into four areas in which our children should be growing. I would like to take a moment to address how each area may affect the lives of our students.

Jesus grew in wisdom. Wisdom is often defined as the proper use of knowledge. If you would observe our classes throughout the day, as I do, you would see an ongoing imparting of knowledge from teacher to student. This week, I spent some time in each class observing this learning process.

You can readily see the progression of knowledge and understanding that is taking place from year to year. As a Christian school, we are able to give our students the full truth. Jesus is "the way the truth and the life," John 14:6. In our first chapel, we worked on learning "the fear of God is the beginning of wisdom." Proverbs 9:10. Teaching our students to follow the Bible, lays the necessary foundation on which to construct all that is being learned. When these elements are in order, both at home and at school, our students will grow in wisdom.

Jesus grew in stature. Physical growth seems to occur with only minimal effort on our part. However, proper growth does need our involvement. Children need physical activity, but they also need proper nutrition and rest. I won't get on a health food soapbox here, but please be attentive to what your children are eating. There are a lot of convenience foods available today. Many are very tasty and yet lack real food value (and are loaded with sugar and salt). Food does affect learning. So does proper rest. Children need on an average a lot more sleep than adults do.

Jesus grew in favor with God. Our students should be growing spiritually. This is probably the least visible area of growth. Faith comes by hearing the word of God, Romans 10:17. The

Bible also exhorts us to "be doers of the word and not hearers only," James 1:22. As parents and educators, it is very important to involve ourselves in spiritual service – ministering to the needy as well as reaching the lost. Are we involved in the body of a good church? Spiritual awareness and growth is so much easier "caught than taught." If this is an area that is not important in your life, you are hindering a major area of needed growth for your child.

Jesus grew in favor with men. Social maturing should take place in young lives from year to year. I have sometimes seen straight-A students, with all of the academic achievements and discipline we could want, act arrogantly toward another person. This shows that there is a major deficit in that person's life. This is probably an area that we all need to be attentive to. How can we train our students to be ambassadors for Christ if we allow them to be unkind or thoughtless to others?

In closing, let me exhort each of us to be growing and maturing as adults. We certainly don't magically arrive at adulthood when we turn 21 or become parents. Working on our own growth will help us to be better teachers to our children.

5th Grade Highlights

After all these years of third and fourth grade teaching, I guess the administration finally thought I could be promoted to fifth grade! It was really neat to move up with this same group of kids, and I am really pleased with how the year has started. It was fun to come back the first day and go out for recess to pick up on our kickball games again! We have recently discussed personal stories involving families that were directly affected by the 9-11 tragedies. We are also digging into Old World History and are amazed to see how destructive civilizations can be when they exclude the true God of Israel.

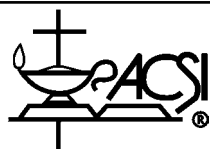
